Dear Mr. Hurtt:

I am writing this letter in response to a report of open burning observed by Mr. Mike Sherron of the Ohio EPA's Southeast District Office. On March 20, 2010, Mr. Sherron observed a large plume of smoke while on Bushmill Road. Upon investigation, he found a large, unattended fire at 2070 Brown Chapel Road, Clarksburg. Tin roofing, a metal frame from a mattress or box springs, aerosol cans, a lamp, shoes, asphalt shingles, vinyl siding, buckets, tires, construction and demolition wastes, appliances, and other household trash were being burned. While he was on site, you approached on a tractor loaded with more waste materials and dumped those materials on the fire before using the tractor to bury the fire with dirt.

Tires, appliances, shingles, furniture, plastics, carpet, rugs, vinyl siding, clothing, demolition wastes and construction wastes cannot be open burned anywhere in Ohio. Open burning of improper waste materials at this location is in violation of Ohio Administrative Code (OAC) rule 3745-19-04 and is punishable by a fine. All open burning in violation of the requirements specified in OAC rule 3745-19-04 must stop immediately. I am enclosing a copy of our open burning regulations for your information and review. If you continue to open burn improper waste materials on this property or any other property, legal action will be taken against you as the open burner and/or the property owner.

You asked Mr. Sherron what types of materials could be open burned. Residential and agricultural wastes may be open burned on the property where the wastes are generated if the property is in an unrestricted area (as this property is) and the burn site is at least 1,000 feet from the nearest inhabited building not located on the property. Residential and agricultural waste includes paper, leaves, tree trimmings, cardboard, crop residues, etc. Buildings, standing or demolished, are not residential or agricultural waste. Please see OAC rule 3745-19-01 for the complete definitions of agricultural and residential waste.


On April 1, 2010, I conducted a follow-up investigation of this incident. No one would answer the door at the 2070 Brown Chapel Road address. The burn site appears to have been covered with dirt and seeded. I left a pamphlet with your son at 915 Betts Lane that explains Ohio's open burning rules with my phone number.
