Dear Mr. Smith:

On August 14, 2012, Wendy Miller and I conducted a compliance evaluation inspection at Huss Equipment Corporation (HEC) located at 17801 North Dixie Highway in Bowling Green, Ohio. We inspected HEC to determine its compliance with Ohio's hazardous waste laws as found in Chapter 3734 of the Ohio Revised Code (ORC) and Chapter 3745 of the Ohio Administrative Code (OAC). Pollution prevention options were also discussed during this inspection. This letter will explain the violations we found and what you need to do to correct these violations.

During our visit we spoke with Mr. Vic Leady and Mr. Troy Druckenmiller and toured your facility. On August 17, 2012, I made a second site visit and met with you to review applicable paperwork and discuss your facility painting operations. HEC is a fabricator of custom material handling equipment such as conveyors, catwalks, and railings. HEC has one vertical mill and one turning machine that are used to manufacture the custom equipment. Coolant/cutting fluids are collected in a bucket and recycled back into the machines. Tramp oil from the machines is generated over time and stored in a 55-gallon drum. Scrap metal is also recycled.

HEC does painting on-site and generates, depending on production volume, approximately 5 to 10 gallons of waste paint solvent (D001, F003, F005) per month. HEC has one open paint booth area and changes the booth filters once every three months. HEC uses the paint booth area to paint the material handling equipment using spray guns and rollers. The spent paint booth filters are managed as a solid waste. HEC also generates spent fluorescent bulbs, which are managed as solid waste.

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HEC stated that shop towels are put in the on-site wood burner or burn barrel.

At the time of our inspection, HEC was operating as a conditionally exempt small quantity generator (CESQG) of hazardous waste.

We found the following violations of Ohio's hazardous waste laws:

1. Waste Evaluation: OAC Rule 3745-52-11:

Any person who generates a waste must determine if that waste is a hazardous waste by using generator knowledge or by testing the waste.

- a) At the time of the inspection, HEC did not have waste evaluation documentation for the spent paint booth filters. HEC has historically disposed of this spent material as a non-hazardous/solid waste via Republic Services. HEC must immediately cease disposing of the waste paint booth filters as non-hazardous waste until a proper waste evaluation has been completed.

HEC must obtain a representative sample of the spent paint booth filter waste stream and have it analyzed for Toxic Characteristic Leaching Procedure (TCLP) Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (RCRA) metals (SW-846 Method 1311/6010) and volatile organics (SW-846 Method 1311/8260). To abate this violation, HEC must submit a copy of the analytical results to Ohio EPA. Once analytical results have been reviewed, Ohio EPA will advise you on proper disposal options as well as plans for the future management of this waste stream.

Ohio EPA may use the data you collect, in part, to make regulatory decisions concerning the waste(s) tested. A data review process, referred to as data validation, may be utilized to confirm the validity of the data. This data validation can include a review of the following components: sampling techniques, sample containers, representativeness of sample, laboratory test methods, laboratory data completeness, documentation of holding time(s), chain(s) of custody and quality assurance/quality control (QA/QC) data. Please include data sufficient for Ohio EPA to perform the data validation review. Information on conducting a data validation can be obtained from Ohio EPA's web page:
http://www.epa.state.oh.us/dhwm/tier_i_data_validation_manual.html.

Ohio EPA will review the submitted waste evaluation information and determine if there is a change in HEC's generator status. Additional violations may be cited based upon your determined generator status. You will be notified of any additional violations in a separate letter.

- b) In addition, HEC failed to have waste evaluation documentation or an established recycling plan in place for the fluorescent bulbs generated at the facility.

Hazardous bulbs are considered "spent materials" and remain hazardous waste even when recycled. Hazardous waste lamp generators have the option of handling their lamps as hazardous waste or as universal waste. Managing hazardous waste lamps under the universal waste rules eases certain regulations imposed on generators of spent lamps.

Please be aware that incandescent, fluorescent, metal halide, neon, high-intensity discharge, high-pressure sodium and mercury-vapor lamps could be hazardous waste when discarded. Fluorescent lamps may contain up to 40 milligrams (mg) of mercury, depending on the brand and manufacturer. Lamps may also contain lead and cadmium. Many lamps exhibit a characteristic of toxicity for heavy metals when disposed. A copy of Fluorescent Lamps: What You Should Know, was given to Troy at the time of our inspection. I recommend that you review this document and contact me if you have any questions.

HEC must submit to Ohio EPA documentation to demonstrate how you plan to properly manage your fluorescent bulbs. If HEC plans to manage the spent fluorescent bulbs when generated as universal waste, please submit the name of the facility where you plan to recycle the bulbs. Managing the spent fluorescent bulbs as universal waste eliminates the need for analytical testing.

On August 17, 2012, during my site visit, you stated that you plan to manage your spent fluorescent bulbs as universal waste and will take them to Environmental Recycling in Bowling Green, Ohio to be recycled.

With this information, this portion of the violation has been abated.

2. OAC Rule 3745-279-22(C)(1): Labeling:

Containers, aboveground tanks, and fill pipes used for underground storage tanks shall be labeled or marked clearly with the words "Used Oil."

HEC had one 55-gallon black poly drum of used tramp oil that was not properly labeled "Used Oil".

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During my site visit on August 17, 2012, you properly labeled the black poly drum with the words "Used Oil". A copy of the fact sheet, The Regulation of Used Oil: An Overview for Ohio Businesses Who Generate Used Oil, was given to you at the time of my inspection. Please review this information and contact me if you have any questions.

With this information, this violation has been abated.

Request for Information:

HEC has been purchasing paint, primer and drum wash thinner from 4 Star Service and Supply LLC located in Sylvania, Ohio. HEC needs to provide a copy of the material safety data sheets (MSDS) for the paint, primer and thinner used at your facility. Looking at the invoices that you provided on August 17, 2012, HEC uses a lot of different colors (i.e. pitthane ultra black, fast dry 35 neutral base, and PPG fast dry 2500 deep base alkyd industrial tan) and must submit the MSDS' for each of the colors used at your facility. In addition, the MSDS' for the primer (2.8 VOC gray primer), thinner (drum wash thinner), and other products used at your facility (i.e. Crown VM&P naphtha, and pitthane ultra catalyst) must be submitted for review.

In addition, it would be helpful if HEC could outline your paint to thinner ratio when painting the equipment either with a spray gun or roller. How does your painter decide how much thinner to use for each gallon of paint when preparing it for use?

Enclosed you will find a copy of the checklists that were completed during the inspection.

HEC needs to immediately take the necessary measures to return to compliance with Ohio's environmental laws. Within **14 days** of receipt of this letter, HEC is requested to provide documentation to this office including the steps taken to abate the violations cited above.

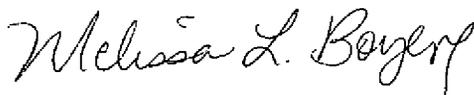
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Documentation of steps taken to return to compliance includes written correspondence, updated policies, and photographs, as appropriate, and may be submitted via the postal service or electronically to melissa.boyers@epa.ohio.gov.

Please be advised that violations cited above will continue until the violations have been properly abated. Failure to comply with Chapter 3734 of the Ohio Revised Code and rules promulgated thereunder may result in a civil penalty of up to \$10,000 per day for each violation. It is imperative that you return to compliance. If circumstances delay the abatement of violations, HEC is requested to submit written correspondence of the steps that will be taken by date certain to attain compliance.
