SUBJECT: CCR VIOLATION

Dear Mr. Ackerman:

Ohio EPA received the 2006 Consumer Confidence Report (CCR) for the Milan Village public water system (PWS) on January 22, 2007. The CCR was reviewed for the required content. Based on our review, the Milan Village PWS is in violation of the Ohio Administrative Code (OAC) Rules 3745-96-01 through 04 for failure to comply with the CCR requirements, the following violation was noted:

- The required source water assessment information was missing.

Your source water assessment was completed and the report was sent to you on March 10, 2003. You were required to notify consumers of the availability of the assessment and how to obtain a copy. The inclusion of a brief summary of your source water susceptibility to contamination based on the findings of the source water assessment was required. A summary was provided to you as part of the source water assessment process. That summary or equivalent language must be included in each CCR.

The following language was suggested for your CCR:

Ohio EPA recently completed a study of the Village of Milan's source of drinking water, to identify potential contaminant sources and provide guidance of protecting the drinking water source. According to this study, the aquifer (water-rich zone) that supplies water to the Village of Milan has a high susceptibility to contamination. This determination is based on the following:

- ▶ The presence of manmade contaminants in treated water. Samples collected between May 20, 1991 and May 16, 2001 contained nitrates above the concentration of 2.0 mg/L on 6 occasions, with concentrations ranging from 2.23 to 4.0 mg/L, which indicates a manmade influence.

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

Be sure to correct the violation as appropriate in your next CCR. The next report for calendar year 2007 must be sent to your customers by no later than July 1, 2008. A copy of the CCR along with a Certification Form must be submitted to the Northwest District Office at the above address. Violations in future reports may result in further enforcement action.
