Dear Mr. Young:

I am writing this letter in response to a complaint received by this office on May 10, 2013. The complaint alleges that you burn tires at your home. During the course of my investigation I found that Ms. Teresa Lawhun owns this property and you live on this property.

On May 22, 2013, I investigated this complaint. Tree trimmings, logs and branches were being burned at the time of my investigation. Evidence of the open burning of tires was observed, along with more than sixty unburned tires that were piled on the property. There were several piles of unburned tree trimmings piled on the property. I spoke to residents in the area who told me that you have a tree trimming service and haul the tree trimmings to your home and burn them. I attempted to speak to you, but you were not home at the time of my investigation. I did speak to Ms. Lawhun at her home in regard to the burning of tires and tree wastes on her property.

Plastics, tires, demolition or construction waste materials, garbage, or any type of waste material that is hauled to a property from another location (including tree trimmings) cannot be open burned in Ohio.

To open burn residential waste such as paper, leaves, tree trimmings, cardboard, etc., the property must be located in an unrestricted area (as this property is) and the burn site must be at least 1,000 feet from any inhabited building not on the property. Because there is not a burn site location on this property that is at least 1,000 feet from any inhabited building not on the property, you cannot open burn residential waste at this location.

You are permitted to have a cookout or campfire using clean, seasoned firewood if the fire is not more than two feet in height and not more than three feet in diameter. The fire must be put out when the cookout/campfire is over and cannot be left unattended.

Open burning of improper waste materials at this location is in violation of Ohio Administrative Code (OAC) rule 3745-19-04 and is punishable by a fine. I am enclosing a pamphlet that explains this rule for you. All open burning in violation of the requirements specified in OAC rule 3745-19-04 must stop immediately. If you continue to open burn improper waste materials at this location or any other location in Ohio, legal action may be taken against you.

I am requesting a written response from you, within 14 days of receipt of this letter, which includes a commitment from you to stop open burning in violation of OAC rule 3745-19-04, a plan and schedule for cleanup of the burn area and any remaining solid waste materials, and a copy of the landfill receipt as proof of proper disposal. Acceptance by Ohio EPA of a schedule for compliance does not constitute a waiver of Ohio EPA's authority to seek civil penalties as provided in section 3704.06 of the Ohio Revised Code. The determination to pursue or to decline to pursue such penalties in this case will be made by Ohio EPA at a later date.
